When second-grader Alvin Ho is invited to a birthday party given by a girl, his fear of everything causes him to dread going.
- FIC LOO Look, Lenore. Alvin Ho : allergic to camping, hiking, and other natural disasters. 1st ed. New York : Schwartz & Wade Books, c2009.  
Alvin makes a new friend and learns that he can be brave despite his fear of everything when his father takes him camping, hoping to install a love of nature like that of their hometown hero, Henry David Thoreau.
- FIC LOO Look, Lenore. Alvin Ho : allergic to girls, school, and other scary things. 1st ed. New York : Schwartz & Wade Books, c2008.  
A young boy in Concord, Massachusetts, who loves superheroes and comes from a long line of brave Chinese farmer-warriors, wants to make friends, but first he must overcome his fear of everything.

When Jake loses his brand new toy airplane, Katie Woo lies and says that she does not know where it is.
- FIC LIN Lin, Grace. Bringing in the New Year. 1st ed. New York : Alfred A. Knopf, 2008.  
A Chinese American family prepares for and celebrates the Lunar New Year.
- FIC YIN Yin. Brothers. New York : Philomel Books, c2006.  
Having arrived in San Francisco from China to work in his brother's store, Ming is lonely until an Irish boy befriends him.
- FIC YAM Yamate, Sandra S. Char siu bao boy. 1st ed. Chicago : Polychrome Pub., 2000.  
After being ridiculed by the others at school, Charlie abandons his favorite Chinese food, char siu bao, and tries to eat more "normal" things, but then he finds a way to convert his friends to the tasty dish.
- 973 Bry Bryan, Nichol. Chinese Americans. Edina, Minn. : Abdo Pub., 2004.  
This book provides information on the history of China and on the customs, language, religion, and experiences of Chinese Americans.
- 973 Ols Olson, Kay Melchisedech. Chinese immigrants, 1850-1900. Mankato, Minn. : Blue Earth Books, 2001.  
This book discusses the reasons Chinese people left their homeland to come to America, the experiences immigrants had in the new country, and the contributions this group made to American society.
- FIC Yep Yep, Laurence. The cook's family. New York : Putnam, c1998.  
As her parents' arguments become more frequent, Robin looks forward to the visits that she and her grandmother make to Chinatown, where they pretend to be an elderly cook's family, giving Robin new insights into her Chinese heritage.
- FIC BLA Blakeslee, Ann R. A different kind of hero. 1st ed. New York : Marshall Cavendish, c1997.  
In 1881 twelve-year-old Renny, who resists his father's efforts to turn him into a rough, tough, brawling boy, earns the disapproval of the entire mining camp when he befriends a newly arrived Chinese boy.
- 921 FA Lu, Chi Fa. Double luck : memoirs of a Chinese orphan. 1st ed. New York : Holiday House, c2001.  
Tells the story of the author's struggles after being orphaned at the age of three and how he held on to his dream of coming to the United States as he passed from one relative to another and was even sold to a Communist couple.

- FIC YEP      Yep, Laurence, 1948-. The dragon's child : a story of Angel Island. 1st ed. New York : HarperCollins, c2008.  
Ten-year-old Gim Lew Yep immigrates from China to America with his father, whom Gim barely knows, and fears he will be a disappointment to his family when he arrives at Angel Island.
- FIC YEP      Yep, Laurence. The earth dragon awakes : the San Francisco earthquake of 1906. 1st ed. New York : HarperCollinsPublishers, c2006.  
Eight-year-old Henry and nine-year-old Chin love to read about heroes in popular "penny dreadful" novels, until they both witness real courage while trying to survive the 1906 San Francisco earthquake.
- FIC MES      Messner, Kate. Escape from the great earthquake. New York : Scholastic Inc., 2017.  
This time Ranger, the time-traveling Golden retriever, finds himself in San Francisco in the middle of the great 1906 earthquake, and his mission is obviously to get a young Chinese immigrant, Lily Chen, to safety, but as they make their way through the ruined and burning city Ranger finds that he must also accomplish something else--finding Lily, who was sold as a servant by her parents, a new family who will care for her.
- FIC YEE      Yee, Lisa. Good luck, Ivy. Middleton, WI : American Girl, [2007].  
In 1976, Ivy must choose between participating in a gymnastics tournament and attending a family reunion, and fears she will wind up disappointing everyone, no matter what she decides to do.
- FIC LEV      Levine, Ellen. I hate English! New York : Scholastic, c1989.  
When her family moves to New York from Hong Kong, Mei Mei finds it difficult to adjust to school and learn the alien sounds of English.
- FIC LOR      Lord, Bette. In the Year of the Boar and Jackie Robinson. 1st ed. New York : HarperCollins, [1984].  
In 1947, a Chinese child comes to Brooklyn where she becomes Americanized at school, in her apartment building, and by her love for baseball.
- FIC Yep      Yep, Laurence, 1948-. The journal of Wong Ming-Chung : a Chinese miner. 1st ed. New York : Scholastic, 2000.  
A young Chinese boy nicknamed Runt records his experiences in a journal as he travels from southern China to California in 1852 to join his uncle during the Gold Rush.
- FIC LEE      Lee, Milly. Landed. 1st ed. New York : Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2006.  
After leaving his village in southeastern China, twelve-year-old Sun is held at Angel Island, San Francisco, before being released to join his father, a merchant living in the area. Includes historical notes.
- FIC NUN      Nunes, Susan, 1937-. The last dragon. New York : Clarion Books, c1995.  
While spending the summer in Chinatown with his great-aunt, a young boy finds an old ten-man dragon in a shop and gets a number of people to help him repair it.
- 394.2 WAT      Waters, Kate. Lion dancer : Ernie Wan's Chinese New Year. New York : Scholastic, [1990].  
Describes six-year-old Ernie Wong's preparations, at home and in school, for the Chinese New Year celebrations and his first public performance of the lion dance.
- FIC YEP      Yep, Laurence, 1948-. The magic paintbrush. 1st ed. New York : HarperCollins, c2000.  
A magic paintbrush transports Steve and his elderly caretakers from their drab apartment in Chinatown to a world of adventures.
- 921 KWA      Torres, John Albert. Michelle Kwan. Childs, Md. : Mitchell Lane Publishers, [1999], c2000.  
A biography of the young Chinese-American figure skater who won National and World Championships in 1996 and a silver medal at the 1998 Winter Olympics.
- 921 KWA      Stewart, Mark. Michelle Kwan : quest for gold. Brookfield, Conn. : Millbrook Press, c2002.  
Reviews the career and life of Chinese-American figure skater Michelle Kwan, who has won five U.S. Nationals and an unprecedented four World Championships, as she looks forward to the 2002 Olympics.

- FIC LEE Lee, Milly. Nim and the war effort. 1st ed. New York : Farrar Straus Giroux, 1997.  
In her determination to prove that an American can win the contest for the war effort, Nim does something which leaves her Chinese grandfather both bewildered and proud.
- FIC Len Look, Lenore. Ruby Lu, brave and true. 1st Aladdin Paperbacks ed. New York : Aladdin Paperbacks, 2006.  
"Almost-eight-year-old" Ruby Lu spends time with her baby brother, goes to Chinese school, performs magic tricks and learns to drive, and has adventures with both old and new friends.
- FIC LOO Look, Lenore. Ruby Lu, empress of everything. 1st ed. New York : Atheneum Books for Young Readers, c2006.  
After Ruby Lu's deaf cousin, Flying Duck, and her parents come from China to live with her, Ruby finds life challenging as she adjusts to her new family, tries to mend her rocky relationship with her friend Emma, and faces various adventures in summer school.
- FIC CHI Chinn, Karen, 1959-. Sam and the lucky money. 1st ed. New York : Lee & Low Books, [1995].  
Sam must decide how to spend the lucky money he's received for Chinese New Year.
- FIC TRO Trottier, Maxine. The tiny kite of Eddie Wing. 1st American ed. New York : Kane/Miller Book Publishers, 1996.  
Too poor to buy a real kite, Eddie flies an imaginary one that catches the attention of Old Chan, the wealthy patron of the kite festival.
- FIC Lin Lin, Grace. The ugly vegetables. Watertown, MA : Charlesbridge, [1999].  
A little girl thinks her mother's garden is the ugliest in the neighborhood until she discovers that flowers might look and smell pretty but Chinese vegetable soup smells best of all. Includes a recipe.
- FIC LOO Look, Lenore. Uncle Peter's amazing Chinese wedding. New York : Atheneum Books for Young Readers, [2006].  
A Chinese American girl describes the festivities of her uncle's Chinese wedding and the customs behind them.
- FIC Yep Yep, Laurence. When the circus came to town. 1st ed. New York : HarperCollins, c2002.  
An Asian cook and a Chinese New Year celebration help a ten-year-old girl at a Montana stage coach station to regain her confidence after smallpox scars her face.
